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- **Local movie production wins award**
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Bye bye Bruce Strapp leaves EDC to head NOHFC



Bruce Strapp, the longtime CEO of the Sault Ste. Marie Economic Development Corporation, stepped down from his position in October.

He accepted a post as Executive Director of the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation, the economic development arm of the Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines and Forestry.

Strapp was with the EDC since 1992.

"I will certainly miss working with the volunteers and staff team as this has been my work family for 18 wonderful years," he said. "Responding to an opportunity to serve all of Northern Ontario is very exciting, but I depart knowing that the Sault and the EDC are very strong to take on new opportunities and challenges. The Board and staff team are prepared for this succession, and I am very confident in their strategy."

With a degree in geography from the University of

Toronto, Bruce began his career in the mine exploration industry and, while in Red Lake, was offered an economic development position in the Northwestern Ontario community. Later, he led the economic development team in Timmins, which gave him a chance to move back to the community where his father was a United Church minister.

In 1992, opportunity knocked again, and Sault Ste. Marie – which was experiencing challenging economic times – pulled Bruce in, and he became head of the local Economic Development Corporation.

During his tenure at the EDC, Bruce was responsible for driving a number of initiatives – from the Destiny Sault Ste. Marie economic diversification strategy, to the build out of the local green sector, to the development of the contact centre industry. In fact, his efforts led to him receiving the 2009 Economic Developer of the Year Award

from the Economic Developers Council of Ontario.

The Board members, volunteers and staff team at the Sault Ste. Marie Economic Development Corporation will dearly miss Bruce, his warm personality and his passion for the community.

"When you work with someone for so long, it's always sad to see them move on," said Greg Punch, volunteer EDC President and Board Chair. "Bruce accomplished a lot during his tenure and, while it's sad to see him leave, we're also excited for the future of Sault Ste. Marie and the Economic Development Corporation"

Dave Murphy, Executive Director of the EDC's Business Sault Ste. Marie division, will be the corporation's acting CEO until a permanent replacement is found.

The EDC is now actively recruiting for a new, permanent Chief Executive Officer, and the competitive search is taking place across the country.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY: Elementa Group/Island Green Energy sign agreement with Caribbean nation

St. Lucia inks deal with local waste-to-energy company

The Government of St. Lucia recently signed an agreement with IGE Island Green Energy and Elementa Group, a Sault-based company with a technology that converts household garbage into clean energy.

Guy Joseph, Minister of Communications, Works, Transport & Public Utilities for the Caribbean nation, was in the Sault this month to approve the deal, tour Elementa's pilot plant at the landfill site, and meet with City representatives.

The Elementa process is as ingenious as it is environmentally friendly. The com-

pany's patented steam reformation technology converts solid waste into a clean, synthetic gas – similar to natural gas – which can be used for power generation.

It's a non-incineration process in an oxygen-free environment, meaning there are no greenhouse gases produced. Not only does the technology have the potential to solve the global problem of garbage, it can also significantly reduce the emission of methane gas at landfills.

"Methane is one of the worst contributors to global warming because it is more than 20 times as dangerous as

CO2 regarding greenhouse gas effects," said Jayson Zwierschke, President and CEO of Elementa Group.

With so many benefits, countries around the world are showing great interest in Elementa. Following the recent agreement with St. Lucia, the nation is expected to build the first full-scale waste-to-energy plant in the Caribbean, which will have the capacity to process the majority of household and industrial waste on the island.

Meanwhile, Elementa's demonstration facility is currently operating in the Sault, and the company is slated to

build a full-scale commercial plant here beginning this fall.

"The fact that the pilot plant is in the Sault, and that the process – in many ways – got its start here, speaks to the vision of our community," said Dave Murphy, Acting CEO of the Economic Development Corporation, which has been working with Elementa for a number of years now. "With so many green sector projects on the front burner, we're justifying our claim of being the Alternative Energy Capital of North America."

Local movie production earns international recognition

Looking for Angelina, a film shot in Sault Ste. Marie a few years back, was recently honoured by Italian Women in the World.

The organization, which recognizes the work of Italians around the globe, gave movie director/producer Sergio Navarretta its 2010 Award of Excellence.

His film tells the true story of a local immigrant, Angelina Napolitano, who mur-

dered her abusive husband in 1911. The event ignited a public debate about domestic violence and the death penalty in Canada.

While the story itself took place here, it wasn't the only reason it was filmed in Sault Ste. Marie.

"We felt very comfortable in the Sault," said Navarretta. "It was very hospitable (to our project), and the support was tremendous. Also, it has

a rich and colourful history."

For supporting the filming of *Looking for Angelina*, Navarretta thanked City Council and staff, along with the SSM Economic Development Corporation.

"It's a great place to film," he said.

Meanwhile, the EDC has been working with other partners to continue to develop the local film sector. For instance, last year, a good por-

tion of *Longfellow*, starring David Morse, was shot here.

"Grouped together, movie productions can have a positive economic impact on our city," said Terri Chiarello, Small Business Advisor for the EDC's Business Sault Ste. Marie division. "The EDC is particularly pleased to have been able to assist with the filming of *Looking for Angelina* because of the significance of the story."

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY: Starwood Energy moves forward with another solar project on Black Road

Another solar farm coming to the Sault

A deal for a second major solar project in Sault Ste. Marie has been reached. The addition will give the city the title of one of the largest solar energy producer in Canada.

Starwood Energy Group, which is currently establishing two 10 megawatt solar farms on Base Line, has announced that another project, totaling 30 megawatts, will be built on Black Road.

"We have received tremendous support from the stakeholders at the local and provincial levels for this important energy infrastructure project, and we are very grateful for this support," said Himanshu Saxena, Starwood's Vice-President.

Once complete, the second phase of Starwood's local solar project will provide electricity for up to 12,000 homes, generating their

power during the middle of the day, a time of highest demand on the power grid.

The facilities will also reduce yearly carbon emissions by an amount equal to displacing 5,700 cars and light trucks each driving 12,000 miles per year or to planting more than 24 million trees in Ontario's forests.

In total, Starwood's solar initiative in Sault Ste. Marie will generate 50 megawatts of electricity, enough to power more than 21,000 homes. This, along with other projects, including the Prince Wind Farm and Elementa's waste-to-energy project, is justifying the city's claim of being the Alternative Energy Capital of North America.

"We're making people believe that we are who we say we are," said Ward 1 Councillor Steve Butland, Co-Chair of the City's Green

Committee.

Meanwhile, the Sault Ste. Marie Economic Development Corporation congratulates Starwood on its announcement and looks forward to continuing to work with them, and other alternative energy producers, in the years to come.

"For a community of 75,000, we are fast becoming one of the largest when it comes to green technology,"

said Dave Murphy, Acting CEO of the Economic Development Corporation. "The second phase of Starwood's solar initiative further supports our branded name of being the Alternative Energy Capital of North America. The Economic Development Corporation is appreciative of the hard work by those in both the public and private sector who supported Starwood and its partners."

And as successful as the Sault Ste. Marie Economic Development Corporation's history has been, the organization firmly believes that the best has yet to come.


